Representative Eddie Bernice Johnson passed away on December 31, 2023 at the age of 88. In January 2023, we highlighted the Congresswoman in the "See it To Be It" section of the newsletter, as she retired from Congress after nearly three decades.

EBJ, as she was known fondly in Texas, was a woman of "firsts." As the ch psychiatric nurse at the Veterans Administration hospital in Dallas, she was the first Black female chief psychiatric nurse. When Representative Johnson was elected to the House of Representatives in 1992, she became the first nurse ever elected to Congress. When she was elected to Chair the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology in 2019, Representative Johnson became the first African American and woman to chair the Committee.

We had the distinct pleasure of interviewing Representative Johnson in March of 2022 in the hearing room of the House Committee on Science, Space and Technology. She was generous with her time and her insights, and very supportive of the mission of Healing Politics.

Eddie Bernice Johnson will be sorely missed by her constituents and the broader public she served, her colleagues in Congress, and the many nurses who have been inspired by her. While we mourn her passing, we are so grateful for her work and proud that our shared profession of nursing was, for her, the foundation for a lifetime of far-reaching public service. She will continue to be an inspiration.

Below are quotes from our March 2022 interview:

"I don't know if there's any other profession that's more prepared than nursing to take on the responsibility of policymaking, but I also know that nursing culture does not encourage it. This means nurses must choose for themse to get involved to affect policy - and we need a lot of them to be at the tables where decisions are made."

"I happen to believe that some of the most useful information that's need and the knowledge base for making that policy, will come from nurses. They have the experience of caring for patients and working with the families of patients. We need that perspective when we're dealing with the health of communities."

Representative Travis Nelson (District 44 - Portland OF

Travis Nelson was appointed to the Oregon House of Representatives in January 2022 and was elected to his first full term as a State Representative in the 2022 general election. He is proud to join the OR legislature as the first Black LGBTQIA+ member

The grandson of Louisiana sharecroppers, he moved with his family to the Pacific Northwest before grade school. Representative Nelson developed a strong work ethic, working in food service, landscaping, and janitorial positions to put himself through community college and then Washington State University's School of Nursing. He specialized in Emergency Nursing, Critical Care Nursing, Medical-Surgical Nursing and Rehabilitation Nursing.

Representative Nelson honed his advocacy skills serving as a union representative and served as Vice President of the Oregon Nurses Association. He states on his legislative website:

"Healthcare is intersectional and is entwined with our environment, housing policy, racial justice, and so many other social determinants of health. It is this intersectionality that initially drove me to run for office."

We "met" Danielle McCamey via the chat in a Center to Champion Nursing in America call and quickly appreciated her engagement in our work. Before long, we asked her to serve on our Advisory Council and have benefited greatly from her perspective and sage advice.

Danielle brings not only her long career in nursing, but her experience as the founder of another non-profit – DNPs of Color. She was inspired to create DNPs of Color (DOCs) because she wanted to create a space, a community, for DOCs to elevate themselves, the nursing profession, and communities through the richness of diversity.

Danielle grew up in a single-parent family home in Northern VA and credits her mother with inspiring her to become a nurse. She started her nursing career at Georgetown University Hospital and obtained both a Master of Science and a Doctorate in Nursing Practice from Georgetown University. Specializing in Acute Care Advanced Practice, her dissertation focused on the integration of palliative care screening of neurosurgical patients on admission. She currently serves as Assistant Dean, Strategic Partnerships at Johns Hopkins School of Nursing.

T've witnessed the profound impact policy decisions have on the well-being of our communities. While I'm driven to advocate for change, I know my voice alone isn't enough. Collectively, nurses and midwives are the most trusted voices with unique perspectives and are ideally positioned to bridge the gap between healthcare and policy. This is where Healing Politics is making an impact-empowering nurses and midwives to run for elected office at all levels and building a culture of civic engagement within our profession."

"I think that each and every one of us should bring ten people to the polls. You know, don't go alone. Always take someone with you when you're going to vote, because the vote is where we have the strength."

Fun Facts



The November 5th general election may seem a long way off, but primary election season is in full swing. While the presidential race takes up a lot of airtime, primary elections are important at the state and local level as well.

- Primaries are important because political parties use primaries and caucuses to determine which candidates will run for their state's partisan offices in the general election.
- It may seem early, but at Healing Politics we are ramping up our (non-partisan) work on voter registration and efforts to enlist poll workers. Why??
- After the "early states" of Iowa, New Hampshire, Nevada, and South Carolina are finished competing to be the *earliest* state, the **2024 primaries will begin** on **March 5!** The busiest primary months are June and August with 13 primaries each.
